LOCAL LAW NO. "K" FOR 2021

A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, NEW YORK, TO PROVIDE FOR THE SAFE DISPOSAL OF OPIOID MEDICATIONS

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, as follows:

SECTION 1: TITLE

This Local Law shall be known as "The Albany County Prescription Opioid Safe Disposal Law."

SECTION 2: PURPOSE AND INTENT

In 2017, this honorable body authorized the County Attorney to join litigation against major drug manufacturers to recover current and future damages to the County taxpayers from abuse of opioid pharmaceuticals. Since then, the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has contributed to an increase in drug-related overdoses in the County. Any reduction in the availability of opioid medications by persons for which the drugs were not prescribed will assist the efforts of ending the opioid epidemic. Proper safe disposal of unused opioids is essential to being certain the drugs do not end up in the wrong hands, or in our environment.

Portable personal use pharmaceutical disposal systems enable the safe and environmentally friendly deactivation of the harmful chemical compounds in opioids. These inexpensive devices can assist in the proper disposal of opioids if provided to wherever a prescription is filled. Under the Albany County Prescription Opioid Safe Disposal Law, points of distribution for prescription opioids within the County will be required to provide each patient with a portable personal use pharmaceutical disposal system with each opioid prescription. Placing prescription opioid disposal systems directly in the hands of patients when the prescription is delivered will provide a more immediate and efficient opportunity for patients to deactivate and properly dispose of prescribed opioids thereby further mitigating the adverse effects of opioids on our County residents and the community.

SECTION 3: DEFINITIONS

- 3.1 "Controlled opioid" means each opioid-related drug and other substance listed in paragraphs (b) and (c) of Schedule II of Section 1308.12 of Part 1308-Schedules of Controlled Substances of Title 21 of the code of Federal Regulations.
- 3.2 "Deliver" or "delivery" means the actual, constructive or attempted transfer from one person to another of a prescribed opioid, whether or not there is an agency relationship.
- 3.3 "Dispense" means to deliver a prescribed opioid to an ultimate user, including by means of the internet, and includes the packaging, labelling, or compounding necessary to prepare the substance for delivery.
- 3.4 "Internet" means, collectively, computer and telecommunications facilities which comprise the worldwide network of networks that employ a set of industry standards and protocols, or any predecessor or successor protocol to such protocol, to exchange information of all kinds. "Internet," as used in this Local Law, also includes other networks, whether private or public, used to transmit information by electronic means.
- 3.5 "Non-retrievable" means the condition or state to which an Opioid shall be rendered following a process that permanently alters that Opioid's physical or chemical condition or state through irreversible means and thereby renders the Opioid unavailable and unusable for all practical purposes. An Opioid is considered "Non-retrievable" when it cannot be transformed to a physical or chemical condition or state as a controlled substance, as defined in 21 C.F.R. 802(6), or controlled substance analogue, as defined in 21 C.F.R. 802(32)(A).
- 3.6 "Opioid" means any drug or other substance having an addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability similar to morphine or being capable of conversation into a drug having such addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability.
- 3.7 "Person" means individual, institution, corporation, business trust, estate, trust, partnership or association, or any other legal entity.
- 3.8 "Pharmaceutical disposal system" means a portable product designed for personal use by the ultimate user for the purpose of allowing the ultimate user of a prescribed opioid to deactivate the prescribed opioid to a non-retrievable condition or state.
- 3.8 "Practitioner" means a physician, dentist, podiatrist, or other person licensed or otherwise permitted under law to dispense a prescribed opioid. Such person shall be deemed a "practitioner" only as to such substances, or conduct relating to such substances, as is permitted by his or her license, permit or otherwise permitted by law.

- 3.9 "Prescribed opioid" means any controlled opioid dispensed pursuant to a prescription by a practitioner.
- 3.10 "Prescription" shall mean an official New York state prescription, an electronic prescription, an oral prescription, an out-of-state prescription, or any one of the foregoing.
- 3.11 "Ultimate user" means a person who has lawfully obtained, and who possesses, a prescribed opioid for his or her own use or for the use of a member of his or her household.

SECTION 4: PHARMACEUTICAL DISPOSAL SYSTEM REQUIREMENT

- 4.1 Simultaneously with the delivery of a prescribed opioid in the County to an ultimate user, the person authorized by law to dispense such prescribed opioid must also simultaneously deliver to the ultimate user a pharmaceutical disposal system.
- 4.2 No person delivering a pharmaceutical disposal system to an ultimate user pursuant to Section 4.1 of this Local Law may charge the ultimate user a fee or other monetary amount for the pharmaceutical disposal system itself, the delivery of the pharmaceutical disposal system to the ultimate user, or any other cost incurred by such person with respect to his, her or its compliance with Section 4.1 of this Local Law.

SECTION 5: ENFORCEMENT

The County Department of Health is hereby granted and shall have the authority to enforce this Local Law on behalf of the County. The County Department of Health may coordinate enforcement with the County Department of Consumer Affairs.

SECTION 6: PENALTIES

Upon a violation of this Local Law the County Department of Health is hereby authorized to enforce this Local Law by exercise of any one or more of its powers granted to it under the New York State Public Health Law and regulations thereunder, including, without limitation, imposition of a civil penalty not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000) upon a person for any and each and every violation of, or failure to comply with, any provision of this Local Law.

SECTION 7: AUTHORITY TO PROMULGATE RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 7.1 The Commissioner of the Albany County Department of Health ("Commissioner") is hereby authorized and empowered to promulgate such rules and regulations as he or she deems necessary to implement this law.
- 7.2 Any rules and regulations promulgated by the Commissioner shall provide a mechanism for covering the costs associated with the pharmaceutical disposal

systems, with such costs being covered out of any settlement related to the lawsuit against pharmaceutical companies.

SECTION 8: ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

- 8.1 In adopting and implementing this Local Law, the County assumes an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. The County does not assume or impose upon its officials and employees an obligation by which any one or more of them could be liable in money damages to any person or entity who claims that a breach proximately caused injury.
- 8.2 This Local Law shall be construed so as not to conflict with applicable federal or state laws, rules or regulations. Nothing in this Local Law shall authorize any County bureau or department to impose any duties or obligations in conflict with limitations on municipal authority established by state or federal law at the time such bureau or department action is taken. The County shall suspend enforcement of this Local Law to the extent that said enforcement would conflict with any preemptive state or federal legislation subsequently adopted.
- 8.3 Nothing in this Local Law is intended to protect anticompetitive or collusive conduct nor shall this Local Law be construed to modify, impair, or supersede the operation of any antitrust law or unfair competition law of the State of New York or the United States.
- 8.4 This Local Law shall be construed in accordance with New York State law, including, without limitation, Title 15 (Storage, Treatment, Disposal and Transportation of Regulated Medical Waste) of Article 27 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law, and shall not be construed in any way that would result in conflict with or preemption by any state law.
- 8.5 This Local Law shall be null and void on the date that statewide or federal legislation goes into effect, incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this Local Law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County. The County Legislature may determine by resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar statewide legislation has been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this Section 6.5.

SECTION 9: STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW ACT COMPLIANCE

The County Legislature, being the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) lead agency, hereby finds and determines that this Local Law constitutes a Type II action pursuant to Section 617.5(c)(20), (21) and/or (27) of Title 6 of the New York Code of Rules and Regulations and within the meaning of Section 8-0109(2) of the New York Environmental Conservation Law as a promulgation of

regulations, rules, policies, procedures, and legislative decisions in connection with continuing agency administration, management and information collection.

SECTION 10: SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, or business shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its specific application.

SECTION 11: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall become effective as provided in Municipal Home Rule Law §27.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT (the "Agreement"), dated as of February 23, 2022, is by and between CAPITAL DISTRICT PHYSICIANS' HEALTH PLAN, INC. ("CDPHP"), a New York not-for-profit corporation having a principal place of business at 500 Patroon Creek Boulevard, Albany, NY 12206, and Albany County Department of Mental Health ("Provider"), a New York Municipality and operator of a New York State OMH-licensed clinic having a principal place of business at 175 Green Street, Albany, New York 12201. Provider and CDPHP shall hereinafter be referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

- A. CDPHP is certified as a health maintenance organization under Article 44 of the New York Public Health Law and is a participating health plan in the Child Health Plus program. Provider is licensed by either (i) the New York State Department of Health ("DOH") under Article 28 of the Public Health Law, (ii) the New York State Office of Mental Health ("OMH") under Article 31 of the Mental Hygiene Law, or (iii) the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services ("OASAS") under Article 32 of the Mental Hygiene Law, and is authorized to provide behavioral health services to individuals enrolled in Child Health Plus program health plans ("Child Health Plus Members").
- B. CDPHP and Provider have entered into a participating provider contract ("<u>Provider Contract</u>") pursuant to which Provider provides health care services to CDPHP's Child Health Plus Members and CDPHP pays for such services at the fees set forth in the Provider Contract (the "<u>Contract Rates</u>").
- C. The final 2015-2016 New York State budget included a provision that requires the fees paid by health plans to providers licensed under Article 28 of the Public Health Law or under Article 31 or 32 of the Mental Hygiene Law for ambulatory behavioral health services provided to Child Health Plus Members to be equivalent to the payments established for such services under the Ambulatory Patient Group ("APG") rate-setting methodology, applicable to services provided on or after April 1, 2015 (see Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2015). To allow health plans to implement the new requirement to pay fees equivalent to the APG methodology, the law further required DOH to determine the applicable services and establish the specific fees for Child Health Plus services in consultation with OMH and OASAS.
- D. DOH did not issue final guidance or regulations necessary to allow health plans to determine the equivalent fees under the APG methodology. Therefore, CDPHP continued to pay Provider for Child Health Plus services at the Contract Rates during the period from April 1, 2015 to December 31, 2021 (the "Settlement Period"). At the direction of DOH, CDPHP has examined the claims data and repriced the claims using the APG software currently in use for the DOH Medicaid program.
- E. DOH is now directing health plans to reimburse providers licensed pursuant to Article 28 of the Public Health Law and Articles 31 and 32 of the Mental Hygiene Law for paid claims for ambulatory behavioral health services provided by certified or licensed professionals to Child Health Plus Members during the period from April 1, 2015 to December 31, 2021 (the "Settled Claims"), the difference between the rates payable under the APG methodology and the Contract Rates.

- NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the Recitals and the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the Parties hereby contract and agree as follows:
- 1. <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. Each of the Recitals set forth above is incorporated by reference into this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Claims Review</u>. The Parties have reviewed all of the Settled Claims (see Attachment A) and have now determined that the full amount payable by CDPHP to Provider to reconcile the payments made by CDPHP with the rates payable under the interim APG methodology does not exceed Fifty-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Two Dollars and 72/100 (\$52,842.72). The Parties agree that this amount is not subject to any interest or late payment penalty.
- 3. Release. This Agreement formally resolves any and all claims of Provider against CDPHP for the obligation under Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2015 to pay for the Settled Claims at fees which are equivalent to the payments established for such services under the APG rate-setting methodology. In consideration of the full and timely performance of all terms and conditions as set forth in this Agreement, Provider will not seek any additional payment or adjustment, including interest, for any of the Settled Claims. Provider represents and warrants that, to the best of its knowledge, no entity or person other than Provider had, has, or claims, any interest in the Settled Claims.
- 4. <u>Payment</u>. To avoid incurring administrative costs and burdens, the Parties have agreed to a lump sum payment in lieu of resubmitting and reprocessing the Settled Claims for adjustment in accordance with APG requirements and methodology. In consideration for the release set forth herein, and in consideration of the rights and obligations created by this Agreement, CDPHP shall pay Provider the total sum of Fifty-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Two Dollars and 72/100 (\$52,842.72) within twenty (20) calendar days after this Agreement is executed by both Parties.
- 5. APG Claims Submission Requirements. Effective upon a mutually agreed upon date (the "APG billing date"), Provider will bill and CDPHP will pay in accordance with the APG rate-setting methodology and APG billing requirements for Child Health Plus services. The Parties agree to execute a separate settlement agreement to resolve any payment differences for services rendered after the Settlement Period but before the APG billing date. Nothing herein shall prohibit the Parties from negotiating, for any future period, a different reimbursement methodology or rate that fully complies with Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2015 and any other applicable federal or state law, rule, regulation, regulatory directive or guidance.
- 6. <u>Binding Effect</u>. The terms of this Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns.
- 7. <u>No Third-Party Beneficiary</u>. No provision of this Agreement shall be construed to confer any third-party beneficiary rights to any non-party.
- 8. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is deemed to be unlawful or otherwise unenforceable, it shall be automatically stricken from this Agreement, and this Agreement shall otherwise remain in full force and effect, to be construed as closely as possible under the circumstances to effectuate the original intent of the parties hereto.

- 9. <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement may not be amended except by the written and executed agreement of the Parties.
- 10. <u>Survival</u>. All provisions of this Agreement that by their nature or express terms survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, shall survive such expiration or termination.
- 11. <u>Governing Law; Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of New York without reference to choice of laws or conflict of law principles. Any litigation commenced pursuant to this Agreement shall be exclusively in Rensselaer or Albany County in the State of New York.
- 12. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original and all of which taken together shall constitute a single instrument.
- 13. Entire Agreement. This Agreement, including any exhibits or schedules annexed hereto, constitutes the entire understanding and agreement between the Parties with regard to all matters herein. There are no other agreements, conditions or representations, oral or written, express or implied, with regard thereto. This Agreement supersedes, in the entirety, any and all previous agreements, whether oral or written, between the Parties concerning the subject matter hereof.
- 14. <u>Authorization; Enforcement</u>. Each signatory hereto warrants and represents that he or she is competent and authorized to enter into this Agreement on behalf of the Party for whom he or she signs. Each Party represents and warrants to the other Party that it has all requisite power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to carry out its obligations hereunder.



Dear Members of New York's Traffic Safety Community:

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) is again pleased to announce this year's grant opportunities. I encourage you to develop innovative programs to help us dramatically reduce the number of fatalities and injuries on our roadways. Traffic safety advocates are invited to submit projects including those that promote equitable traffic safety practices in our diverse communities. I look forward to working with you and your colleagues as we strive to enhance the safety of motorists on our roadways and provide quality customer service to our shared constituency.

While motor vehicle fatality and serious injury data for 2021 are still preliminary in New York State, early statistics indicate that fatalities and serious injuries are rising. Fatalities were up 10% from 2019 to 2020 and preliminary data indicate another 9% increase from 2020 to 2021. We have seen an increase in motorcycle fatalities and an overall increase in impaired driving, unsafe speed, and a lack of seatbelt use. With this data, we need to increase our efforts in altering dangerous behaviors on our roads. I urge you to continue your efforts toward helping us to save lives in your traffic safety endeavors and to reach deeper into your communities to work with non-traditional partners.

Recently, The United States Department of Transportation released its <u>National Road Safety Strategy</u> that sets a goal of zero roadway fatalities and draws attention to the national traffic safety crisis plaguing America's roads. The National Roadway Safety Strategy offers a strong endorsement of the <u>Safe System Approach</u>, a comprehensive set of strategies to help address the ongoing surge in roadway deaths. Specifically, the strategy reinforces that education and equitable enforcement are key pillars of the Safe System approach.

Traffic safety initiatives undertaken at the local level and funded by GTSC grants have supported our efforts to reduce all types of crashes including those related to speed, impairment, motorcycles, occupant protection, bicyclists, pedestrians, and commercial motor vehicles. The implementation of programs that educate the public on the dangers of drowsy, impaired, distracted, and aggressive driving and the enforcement of these traffic safety laws continue to make New York a national leader in highway safety.

Our consistent success in New York State can be largely attributed to the innovative and data driven programs that our grantees implement each year and from the partnerships we have formed among local, state and federal partners. We, at the GTSC, do not take these relationships for granted and are thankful to all our partners who work tirelessly each day to drive fatality, crash and injury rates down.

As you prepare to write your grant applications, please keep in mind that speed, impairment, and distraction continue to lead the way in terms of contributing factors in crashes and that vulnerable

roadway users (pedestrians, bicyclists, etc.) account for a sizable share of roadway fatalities. These non-motorist crashes represented 29% of total fatal crashes in 2020. Motorcycle fatalities are up more than 43% in 2021 from 2019.

Your sustained efforts and dedication to highway safety are to be commended and recognized for the valuable contribution made toward making New York a safe state in which to live, work and travel. Together, we will maintain our strong commitment to making our state's roadways safer for all.

March 2022

I. Structured Programs - Child Passenger Safety and Police Traffic Services:

Child Passenger Safety (CPS) - These grants will continue to support the educational activities of child passenger safety programs through the four different initiatives or schedules: fitting stations, awareness trainings, car seat check events and car seat education & distribution programs for low income families.

Please note: In Federal Fiscal Year 2023 there will be funding available for the purchase of a **limited number** of car seats/child restraints for use with Schedule A – Permanent Fitting Stations, Schedule C – Car Seat Check Events and Schedule D-Car Seat Education & Distribution Programs. Schedules A and C will require hands-on education pertaining to the proper use and installation of a car seat. In the event it is determined a car seat needs to be replaced, preestablished guidelines need to be followed

before providing a replacement seat. Funds will also be available for the purchase of a limited number of car seats for use with Schedule D – Car Seat Education & Distribution Programs. Schedule D will require the verification of low income status as well as in classroom instruction about child restraint systems and hands-on education pertaining to the proper use and installation of car seats.

Police Traffic Services (PTS) - The Federal Fiscal Year 2023 Police Traffic Services (PTS) grant program will provide funding to law enforcement agencies to conduct traffic enforcement. In addition to having a current mandatory seat belt use policy in place for police officers of the department, participation in the national Click It or Ticket seat belt enforcement mobilization is required. This program will also fund agencies to conduct traffic enforcement details based on the crash data of their local jurisdiction, with the goal of impacting motorist behavior and

The incentive funding for these structured programs is limited. GTSC may not be able to fund all of your initiatives. Applicants may request up to the maximum grant amount of \$40,000 for CPS and up to \$46,000 for PTS. There is no minimum request amount.

II. General Highway Safety Grants - The highway safety grant application for local, state and not-for-profit agencies is available to address a particular highway safety problem in their jurisdiction. This proposal requires applicants to submit a narrative outline of the problem with supporting data, details of the proposed activities with milestones and an evaluation plan.

Proposals must address one of the program areas included in the state's Highway Safety Strategic Plan, which can be found online at https://trafficsafety.ny.gov/highway-safety-grant-program. Program areas considered for the general Highway Safety Grant funding include: occupant protection; traffic enforcement; motorcycle safety; traffic records; community programs; programs that impact our younger drivers or older drivers; pedestrian safety; roadway safety and impaired driving.

In 2023, our impaired driving program will focus on statewide projects that support training, enforcement, and technology and state agencies' initiatives to support the efforts of the County STOP-DWI programs. We anticipate that available federal funding will once again be limited this year so applications need to be detailed and supported by data.

Highway Safety Strategic Plan - Every year, the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee prepares the Highway Safety Strategic Plan (HSSP). This plan is the road map for traffic safety professionals in the state and is based on

issues and strategies identified by the GTSC member agencies, other state and local agencies, law enforcement agencies and not-for-profit organizations. The HSSP can be found online at https://trafficsafety.ny.gov/highway-safety-grant-program. We invite you to contact the GTSC if you have suggestions for the HSSP.

Problem Identification - Since successful programs are data-driven, we encourage you to use the crash and ticket data reports that are available for each county through an online database developed by the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research (ITSMR) with funding from the GTSC. The database, called the Traffic Safety Statistical Repository (TSSR), contains crash and ticket data from 2011 forward, including preliminary crash and ticket data for the current year, and crash and ticket data for 2021.

To access the TSSR, please visit https://www.itsmr.org/sas-guest-portal/. Several help tools are available on the site, including a User Guide, FAQ, Glossary of Terms and TSSR Directory. Please contact your Highway Safety Program Representative at the GTSC if you have questions.

Application Procedure - The due date for all applications is May 2, 2022. Not-for-profit agencies must register with and be pre-qualified in the New York State Grants Gateway before submitting a GTSC grant proposal. Proposals received from not-for-profit applicants that have not registered and are not pre-qualified in the Grants Gateway on the proposal due date of 11:59 PM on May 2, 2021 cannot be evaluated. Such proposals will be disqualified from further consideration. If you need assistance with Grants Gateway enrollment or enrollment in the GTSC's eGrants, contact the GTSC.

General instructions for preparing grant applications are included in the eGrants system. If your agency does not have a Project Director currently enrolled in eGrants, contact the GTSC for guidance. Frequently asked questions, an overview of the requests for proposals, application and review process can be found online at https://trafficsafety.ny.gov/highway-safety-grant-program.

Applications must be submitted using the GTSC eGrants system. The due date for General Highway Safety, Child Passenger Safety and Police Traffic Services grant applications is May 2, 2022.

Applications submitted after May 2, 2022 will not be considered. Applicants must submit their proposals by changing the status of their completed 'In Process' proposal to 'Submit' on or before May 2, 2022.

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee administers highway safety grant funding in accordance with 23 CFR Part 1300 Uniform Procedures for State Highway Safety Programs and 2 CFR Part 200 Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principals, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards and according to the guidelines published by the GTSC in the structured applications and the Guide to Preparing a Highway Safety Program applications. Grants are reviewed for approval based on the criteria stated on the application. In general, the review is based in part on past performance, agreement to perform requested activities, significance of problem identified, supported by data and rationale of proposed solution.
