funds deposited with Albany County are encumbered. The contemplated allocations shall only take place if an agreement between Albany County and the Advance Albany County Alliance is authorized by the Albany County Legislature and in force.

INTRODUCTION

The enabling legislation creating the Authority (Chapter 686 of the Laws of 1993) sets forth in section 2784.3. (a) The following:

"On or before September first, nineteen hundred ninety-five, and on or before September first on every fifth year thereafter, the authority shall submit to the county legislature a capital projects plan for the five-year period commencing January first of the following year. The plan shall set goals and objectives for capital spending and describe each capital project proposed to be initiated in each of the years covered by the plan. Each plan shall also set forth an estimate of the amount of capital funding required each year and the expected sources of such funding required."

The first-five-year capital program covering the years 1996 through 2000 totaling \$49,571,843 was approved by the Albany County Legislature in Resolution 280 adopted on September 11, 1995. There was one amendment to the five-year capital plan for \$6,605,319 approved in Resolution 251 adopted on July 13, 1998 which increased the total approved capital program to \$56,177,162.

The five-year capital plan for years 2000 through 2004, totaling \$232,400,000, was approved by the Authority on February 7, 2000 and by the Albany County Legislature in Resolution No. 39-00, adopted on February 14, 2000. There was one amendment to the five-year capital plan for \$26,000,000, approved in Resolution No. 180, adopted on April 14, 2003, increasing the total amount to \$258,400,000.

The five-year capital plan for the years 2005 through 2009 totaling \$264,900,000 was approved by the Authority May 3, 2004 and the Albany County Legislature Resolution No. 400, adopted August 9, 2004.

The five-year capital plan for the years 2010 through 2014, totaling \$139,300,000, was approved by the Authority September 14, 2009 and by the Albany County Legislature Resolution No. 477, adopted December 7, 2009.

The five-year capital plan for years 2015 through 2019, totaling \$120,520,000, was approved by the Authority on September 22 2014 and by the Albany County Legislature in Resolution No. 411, adopted on November 10, 2010. An amendment to the five-year capital plan for \$22,000,000, approved in Resolution No. 167, adopted

on May 7, 2017, increased the total amount to \$142,520,000. A second amendment to the 2015-2019 five-year capital plan is attached to this 2020 through 2024 five-year capital plan that decreases the plan by \$5.66 million to \$136.86 and reflects increased spending on projects that received more than previously anticipated levels of federal and state grant funding.

The five-year capital plan for years 2020 through 2024, totaling \$180,000,000, was approved by the Authority in Resolution 10.3 on July 22, 2019 and by the Albany County Legislature in Resolution No. 411, adopted on October 15, 2019. An amendment to the five-year capital plan, approved by the Authority in Resolution in Resolution No. 10.1, adopted on November 7, 2022, and the by the Albany County Legislature in Resolution No. 434, adopted on November 14, 2022, increased the total amount to \$171,330,000.

The five-year capital plan presented for the years 2025 through 2029 provides for potential projects totaling \$283,350,280. The projects included represent the Authority's estimate of the numerous potential airport developments which could occur during the next five years. The estimates are based upon the best case scenario for variable economic and aviation industry conditions during the five-year plan period. A description of each project is included herein. Some of these projects are contingent upon the future realization of currently potential increases in airport passenger traffic and/or airport tenant activities. Therefore, the actual initiation and projected timing for each project could be altered and the project may not actually be initiated during the five-year plan. Factors that could cause increases in activities at the Airport include introduction of one or more new commercial carriers, leasing property to new aeronautical tenants, and improvements in the regional and national economies.

Certain projects included in the 2020 through 2024 capital program are included in the 2025 through 2029 capital program and are either underway or are reoccurring type projects.

The potential funding sources represent the Authority's current estimate of those projects which are eligible for federal funding and the related New York State share thereof and funding from State only grants. As of this date it is not known what the total amount of Federal entitlement or discretionary funding will be made available to the Authority during this five-year period. The remaining projects, if they are initiated, will be funded by Authority resources, either from airport capital funds or from the issuance of Authority debt.

Many of the projects are dependent on future growth in passengers, cargo and general aviation usage of the Airport and the related support facilities and equipment needed to meet that growth. Also, many of these projects are dependent on their eligibility for available Federal and State funding, or on the ability of the Authority to issue debt. The actual timing for starting each project is dependent upon this growth and availability of funding.

The total effect any Capital Program will have on future operating budgets is evaluated at the time a specific project is initiated by the Authority unless a project is mandated for safety or health purposes. All other projects are undertaken based on a cost-benefit analysis.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The legislation creating the Authority set forth the following for its creation:

GOAL:

To provide adequate, safe, secure and efficient aviation and transportation facilities at a reasonable cost to the people.

OBJECTIVES:

To promote safe, secure, efficient and economic air transportation by preserving and enhancing airport capacity.

To acquire, construct, reconstruct, continue, develop, equip, expand, improve, maintain, finance and operate aviation and other related facilities and services.

To stimulate and promote economic development, trade and tourism.

To form an integral part of a safe and effective nationwide system of airports to meet the present and future needs of civil aeronautics and national defense and to assure inclusion of the Authority's facilities in state, national and international programs for air transportation and for airport or airway capital improvements.

To ensure that aviation facilities shall provide for the protection and enhancement of the natural resources and the quality of the environment of the State and the Capital District area.

ACTIVITIES:

All the projects included in the five-year capital plan for the years 2020 through 2024 are designed to meet the above objectives as set forth in the Airport's Master Plan and Airport's Safety Improvement Program. All projects have or will be subject to a Federal Environmental Assessment (EA) pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), as amended, and a New York State Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA). Specific airfield related projects eligible for Federal or State funding support will also be subject to Federal Aviation Administration and New York State Department of Transportation review and approval.

HISTORY OF AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT

Albany Airport, *America's First Municipal Airport* consisted of an airfield developed in 1909 along the Hudson River on what is now known as Westerlo Island, in the southeastern portion of the City of Albany. At one time, the airport was named Quenton Roosevelt Field in memory of President Theodore Roosevelt's son, Quenton, who was killed while flying in France in World War One.

The airport played an integral role in the early history of American aviation when Glenn H. Curtiss flew from Albany to New York City on May 29, 1910. This achievement, which was the first sustained flight between two major American cities, opened the way to airmail and passenger flights, and thus the establishment of commercial aviation in this country. It is noteworthy that Charles Lindbergh landed his *Spirit of St. Louis* at Quenton Roosevelt Field on July 27, 1927 following his completion of the first nonstop solo flight from New York to Paris.

Shortly before Lindbergh's landing at Albany, plans were being considered to relocate the airfield to land owned by the Watervliet Shakers in what is now the Town of Colonie. Eventually, the Airport was moved to its current location and officially opened as Albany Municipal Airport on October 1, 1928, giving it the distinction of being America's first municipal airport.

Albany Municipal Airport was owned and operated by the City of Albany until 1960. At that time, the city determined that it could no longer afford to finance the airport, and ultimately sold the facility to Albany County for \$4,437,000. The County embarked on the construction of a terminal building in 1959. The terminal opened in 1962 and was regarded as the beginning of a new era for the airport.

Construction of a second terminal building, offering the first enclosed jet ways at the Airport, was started in 1979 and completed in 1982, as was the last of several runway extensions which lengthened the original 3,000 foot and 4,000 foot runways to 6,000 and 7,200 feet, respectively. The airport then was able to routinely handle large aircraft including 727s, 737s, and DC-9s. Through the years many presidents, either as candidates or in office, have visited Albany Airport. These include Franklin D. Roosevelt, Richard Nixon, and John F. Kennedy. In November 1994, President Bill Clinton visited Albany traveling on Air Force One, a 747 aircraft.

The progressive growth and development of Albany County Airport has also been evidenced by the number of airlines operating out of Albany. When the main terminal opened in the early 1960s, the airport was served by only four carriers. Over the next 35 years, passenger levels increased from 400,000 in 1964 to over 2.9 million in 2018. In 2018, Albany was served by seven commercial airlines and nine-teen commuter carriers and the two cargo carriers.

ALBANY COUNTY AIRPORT AUTHORITY CREATED

The Authority was created in 1993 pursuant to the Albany County Airport Authority Act, Title 8, as amended, of the State of New York Public Authorities Law (Act). The County of Albany (County) and the Authority entered into a permanent Airport Lease Agreement dated December 5, 1995, which became effective May 16, 1996 following approval by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for the transfer of the sponsorship of the Airport from the County to the Authority. Under the lease agreement as amended, that expires forty December 31, 2049, the County leases to the Authority the Airport, including all lands, buildings, structures, and easements, right of access, and all other privileges and appurtenances pertaining to the Airport.

The Airport is a body corporate and politic constituting a public benefit corporation established and existing pursuant to the Act. The State created the Authority in order to promote the strengthening and improvements of the Airport and to facilitate the financing and construction of the initial Terminal Improvement Project (TIP), other subsequent capital improvement plans and gave the Authority the power to operate, maintain and improve the Airport.

On March 15, 1994, the County transferred net assets equal to 46,824,500 from the County to the Authority.

In March 1998 the airport was renamed the Albany International Airport in recognition of past and projected increased international activity at the airport.

Under an amendments to the Agreement dated June 29, 2005 and November 2, 2018 the Authority leases four additional parcels totaling approximately 3.4 acres and 3.5 acres respectively which were developed for additional parking. The Authority paid the County as of that date \$478,500 as consideration in 2005 and \$420,000 as consideration in 2018.

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENTS BY THE AUTHORITY

On July 17, 1996, ground was broken for construction of a new air-cargo building in the northeast quadrant of the airport as the first step in consolidating the present and developing the future air-cargo capacity for the Airport. The \$11 million cargo facility and related airfield and landside improvements were financed by Airport Revenue Bonds. This facility opened in October 1998 and is under a long-term lease agreement with Aviation Facilities Company, Inc. (AFCO).

On October 3, 1996, ground was broken for the Terminal Improvement Project (TIP). The TIP consisted of a new terminal and other facilities to replace the 1959 terminal and was designed to accommodate future demands for approximately 1.5 million annual enplanements. The TIP was substantially complete on October 1, 1998.

In February 1997, the Authority issued \$96,305,000 of Airport Revenue Bonds to finance the TIP and certain capital improvement projects initiated by the County prior to the creation of the Authority.

In December 1997, the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York issued \$41,395,000 of State Service Contract Revenue Bonds for the purposes of financing, construction, reconstruction, improvements, reconditioning and preservation of the Airport or aviation capital projects at the Airport. The Revenue Bonds were secured by a service contract under which the State of New York agreed to pay the annual principal and interest payments. The Revenue Bonds are not debt of the Airport Authority nor is the Airport Authority liable thereon.

Proceeds totaling \$40 million were used by the Authority toward the cost of constructing the new terminal building, a connecting bridge and a parking garage at the Airport. The Authority allocated \$20 million each towards the cost of the terminal and the garage.

The Authority maintains a Federal Inspection Station to process regularly scheduled international flights together with other general aviation and international cargo flights.

On June 7, 1998, airline operations began in the new terminal facility and demolition began on the 1959 structure.

In July 1998, the Authority, through the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation (EFC) received \$7.5 million Series A bonds to finance the total construction of a new glycol wastewater treatment system. In July 1999, the loan was replaced by \$7,895,303 bonds issued by the EFC with interest on the first \$3 million 100% subsidized and the remaining \$4.5 million 50% subsidized by the New York State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund.

On December 1, 1998, the Authority sold two Airport Revenue Bond issues totaling \$30,695,000 to finance two capital projects:

- The 1998 B (non-AMT) issue totaling \$18,455,000 was sold to finance in part the construction of a new 1,600-space parking garage. The garage partially opened in December 1998 for use by short-term visitors to the Airport and the balance used for long-term parking was opened in February 1999.
- The 1998 C (AMT) issue totaling \$12,240,000 was sold to finance the construction of the new 50,500 square foot air cargo building which was opened during October 1998 for use by Airborne Express, Federal Express and United Parcel Service.

In March 1999, operations began in the newly constructed air traffic control tower located in the northeast quadrant of the airport. Demolition also began on the old control tower to provide additional apron area for use by the airlines.

In April 2000, construction was completed for the addition of approximately 16,000 square feet of terminal space including ticketing, baggage make up and hold rooms to accommodate the arrival of Southwest Airlines which began service May 7, 2000. This addition was principally financed through the receipt of a \$6 million grant from the State of New York.

In May 2000, construction of 874 space remote surface parking lot was completed at the southeast quadrant of airport property to accommodate the additional parking required by the increase in enplanements as a result of the addition of Southwest Airlines.

In July 2000, the Authority, through the EFC, entered into a 10-year \$2,374,936 Series B loan agreement with the New York State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund to finance the construction of a glycol filtration polishing facility. The interest thereon is fifty percent subsidized by the New York State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund.

In November 2000, a parking garage expansion was opened to accommodate 307 parking spaces for the rental car operators and 400 additional spaces for public parking.

In December 2000, The Authority issued \$14,500,000 of Airport Revenue Bonds to finance the construction that began in 2001 of a New York State Police Executive Hangar to consolidate the State's

current aircraft and maintenance support facilities which were located in two widely separated

hangars on the airfield. The new facility completed in 2002 consists of approximately 84,630 square feet of hangar, maintenance support office space and includes all the necessary mechanical, electrical, plumbing, fire, security and energy management systems; crane and hoist equipment and other support equipment for aircraft maintenance; and office furnishings. Landscaping, parking lot, and security fence to secure the leased area also were provided. The Authority and the Division of New York State Police entered into a thirty (30) year Land and Facility Lease Agreement effective April 1, 2000. These Airport revenue payments are sufficient to amortize the debt service payments for this Bond issue plus any other related costs incurred by the Authority.

In 2001, the Authority began construction of a new ARFF facility and general aviation T-Hangars. In 2001, the Authority also obtained final FAA and all other required approvals for the extension of Runway 10-28 from 6,000 to 7,200 feet. Construction began in 2002. This project also included extending taxiway "C" and related hold apron and service road improvements. The runway was completed and opened in August 2003.

In July 2001, the Authority acquired a 9½ acre Industrial Park with four warehouse type buildings totaling 27,500 square feet. In 2002, renovations were completed and the ground support facilities for American Airlines, US Airways plus Lansing Flight Support were relocated from the old belly-freight building. In addition, KME Fire Apparatus leased one building to which an addition was added to support their requirements.

In 2002, construction was completed on a 10-bay T-Hangar facility, a self-service fueling facility, and a neighboring tie-down area for use by the general aviation community. Construction began on a second T-Hangar building to provide 10 more T-Hangar units. This construction was completed in 2003. All units are leased.

An extension to the remote parking lot "E" began in 2002 which nearly doubled the capacity to 2,000 plus public parking spaces. As a result of several adjoining land acquisitions, expansion work continued into 2004.

During 2003, the Airport Authority received Federal support for the complete rehabilitation of the primary runway 1-19 including the complete replacement of centerline lighting. The work was completed in 2003. Also during 2003, the Airport Authority received all necessary approvals to begin extension of the primary runway from 7,200 to 8,500 feet. The work was completed in 2006.

During 2003, the Authority was granted \$2.3 million of State funds through the support of State Senator Joseph Bruno to acquire and install two over-the-wing loading bridges for Southwest Airlines. Albany International Airport was the first airport in the United States to have two such bridges in operation.

In June 2003, the Authority sold \$8,855,000 of Series 2003A Airport Revenue Bonds to pay the costs of various land, hangars, and equipment acquisitions, apron and runway expansions, taxiway, runway and hangar rehabilitations, certain terminal expansions and leasehold improvements.

In March 2004, the Authority, through the NYS EFC, issued \$388,316 of Airport Revenue Bonds to finance the construction of sanitary sewer and water improvements in the Airport Industrial Park.

Other major projects completed in 2004 included finalizing renovations to the terminal to accommodate TSA security personnel and to provide space for their passenger screening and baggage inspection operations. Construction on the main runway extension from 7,200 to 8,500 feet started in 2004 and was completed in 2006 together with related navigation aids and taxiways. Remote parking was expanded by approximately 700 additional spaces to accommodate an ever-increasing demand for on-airport parking. Also a new US Postal facility was opened.

In 2005, the Authority acquired the on-airport assets of the former FBO (\$3.0 million). With this acquisition the Authority assumed responsibility for managing and operating the FBO. The Authority operates the FBO under the trade name "Million Air – ALB". The Authority also acquired an office building and two warehouses for future lease opportunity, and to provide 400 additional remote surface parking spaces (\$2.4 million). In 2005, the Authority also completed a \$2.8 million aircraft engine run-up attenuation facility to enhance the containment of noise from the Airport.

In June 2006, the Authority issued \$14,230,000 of bonds to provide funds for various land, hangar, equipment acquisitions, hangar rehabilitations, certain terminal renovations, utility improvements, and parking expansions.

In December 2006, the Authority issued \$6,330,000 of bonds to provide funds for construction of the 42,800 square foot Aviation Service and Maintenance Facility which was completed in late 2007.

In 2008 the Authority completed construction of two general aviation T-Hangars, installation of two additional escalators in the terminal and installation of new touch down lighting improvements that preserve and enhance aeronautical safety during nighttime, low-visibility, winter and other inclement weather conditions for all aircraft operations by allowing landing with half-mile rather than three-quarter mile visibility conditions.

During 2009 the Authority continued the Latham Water Towers Runway 10/28 obstruction relocation. The Authority also undertook a rehabilitation of an existing hangar, lighting energy upgrades in the parking garage and several smaller projects involving roof replacement, terminal improvements and improvements in landside buildings.

In 2010 major renovations of six terminal food and beverage concession areas that began in 2009 were completed at a cost of approximately \$3.0 million which was fully funded by the concessionaire, replacement of all parking garage lighting with more energy efficient lights at a cost of \$156,000 was completed with the aid of a \$54,300 grant. Rehabilitation of the Taxiways and ramps for \$2,826,000; construction of a new entry and exit to the remote parking lot providing for additional and interstate highway access at a cost of \$363,300; expansion of glycol storage and replacement of the Type I glycol proportioning system at an estimated total design and construction cost of \$339,000.

Projects completed in 2011 include a parking garage rehabilitation project at a cost of \$896,000, a passenger jet bridge replacement project with a cost of \$581,000, an automated entry and exit station in the economy parking lot at a cost of \$336,274 the relocation and upgrade of the Authority operated retail store (DepARTures) in the Terminal at a cost of \$281,000.

The completion of the Runway 28 obstruction removal, which involved relocation of a municipal water tank at a cost of \$11,187,000 was completed in 2012. Other projects completed in 2012 included the Terminal Floor replacement with at a cost of \$821,400 and a Semi-inline Baggage Screening Project with a cost of \$1.1 million.

During 2013 projects completed included Glycol Storage & Processing Improvements to add a new 2.5 million gallon storage tank. During 2013 project to upgrade of the Electrical Vault at a cost of \$1.3 million was advanced along with the rehabilitation of the Administration Building (\$1.7 million).

In 2014 construction began on projects to add a new a new Runway Friction Material Building at a cost of \$2.4 million, upgrade of an existing commercial Aircraft Maintenance, Repair and Overhaul Facility and construct a new hangar at a cost of \$4.2 million, and Rehabilitate Runway 1/19 at a cost of \$4.72 million. These projects were completed by the close of 2015.

During the 2009-2014 Capital Plan the Authority also purchased approximately \$5 million in major equipment including items such as two fire trucks, runway snow blowers, runway brooms, shuttle busses, street sweepers, and other heavy equipment.

During 2015 projects to provide a new terminal roof at a cost of \$1.5 million and the Terminal Baggage Room Renovation at \$1.5 and Glycol Storage and Processing improvements for \$1.1 million initiated and completed in 2016.

During 2016 a \$3.4 million passenger loading bridge replacement and renovation project and \$1.4 million Fiber Optic replacement project were initiated.

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During 2017 a \$3.4 million passenger loading bridge replacement and renovation project and \$1.4 million Fiber Optic replacement project were completed. Also in 2017 a \$4.4 million Runway 01/19 Edge Lighting System Replacement and a \$4.2 million phase 2 passenger loading bridge replacements and renovation were initiated.

During 2018 the Airport started a \$1.9 million escalator replacement project in the Terminal and Authorized another \$1.0 million passenger loading bridge replacement and numerous smaller projects under \$1.0 million.

In 2018 the Airport was awarded a \$22.1 million grant to provide a portion of the funds for project to build an additional parking garage, parking access improvements, and provide Terminal rehabilitation and other passenger amenities with a total current estimated cost of \$57 million. The grant was awarded in conjunction with a \$50 million State-funded Airport highway access project announcement. The new highway access will be very beneficial for the Airport access to on-airport parking operations.

As of December 31, 2018, the Authority maintained \$454.4 million in capital assets for which \$271.0 million in accumulated depreciation was recorded resulting in \$237.3 million in capital assets net of depreciation.

Although most of 2019 was consumed with the construction of the parking garage and the rehabilitation of the airport terminal, there were other airport improvement projects. These included the installation of LED edge lighting for the full length of Runway 1/19 and Taxiway C. Also 2019 included the installation of new full hangar door at the FBO hangar.

As of December 31, 2021, the four (4) passenger boarding bridges have been replaced, and the Airport's first Master Plan in over twenty Years has begun. In addition, the Taxiway A Rehabilitation project is essentially completed.

As of December 31, 2022 the Airport Pavement Management Program, and Terminal Fire Alarm Replacement, Hangar 1 Sprinkler, and the Taxiway A projects have all been completed. Also in 2022, Parking Lot C was reverted back into an aircraft apron and improvements to the Air Traffic Control Tower were initiated.

As of December 31, 2023 the Rehabilitation of Rwy 10/28, replacement of Terminal Escalators #22 and #23, replacement of roof on Bldg. #109 (FBO), and the design of Terminal Concourse A have all be completed. Also, in 2023, the airport purchased on loader (\$369,000) and one sweeper (\$580,635). Also in 2023, the Authority started the construction of a \$100,000,000 Terminal Connector bridge that was funded by State/FAA sources, 60/40 percent.

In 2024, the Authority embarked on a project to add two (2) gates onto Concourse A at a cost of approximately \$22,000,000 funded partially with a \$10,600,000 Terminal Improvement grant.

POTENTIAL FUNDING SOURCES

Federal - Represents Federal entitlement and potential discretionary dollars available to fund eligible airfield capacity and safety related projects. Eligible projects generally are funded at 90% of the eligible project costs.

NY State - Represents New York State share of eligible Federal Projects (generally 5%) plus any State discretionary dollars that may be appropriated for the Airport.

ACAA - Represents the Authority's share of eligible Federal Projects (5% to 10%). In addition, the costs of other projects will be funded by Airport generated operating funds or by the issuance of indebtedness.

Generally facilities to be funded by the issuance of Authority indebtedness will be initiated only when the project is expected to generate sufficient revenues or cost savings to meet the annual debt service payments. For example, construction of hangars, freight buildings or private use facilities would only be initiated when tenants have been identified and have committed to leasehold payments sufficient to cover the debt service payments and any operating costs to be borne by the Authority

Before the issuance of bonds is considered for any project, the Authority will evaluate whether any funds are available from other sources to cover all or a portion of the ACAA's share of the costs. This will include monies available under the Airline Use and Lease Agreement and any monies available in reserve funds held by the Authority. The table below reflects the preferred sources of funds based upon the type of Airport Project.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEENT BY AND BETWEEN ALBANY COUNTY AND 1199 SEIU UNITED HEALTH CARE WORKER'S EAST

This memorandum of Agreement by and between the County of Albany ("County" and the 1199 ("Union") sets forth the full agreement of the parties to a successor agreement for the period January 1, 2019- December 31, 2023, for the period January 1, 2024-December 31, 2027.The terms and conditions of the 2017-2021 collective bargaining agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless otherwise specifically modified, changed, or altered by the Memorandum of Agreement. This Memorandum of Agreement is subject to ratification by members of the Union and approval by the County Legislators of Albany County.

Article 2 Section 1A

Modify hours worked to reflect the current number of hours: modify: 35 to 37.5; modify 70 hours to 75 hours. Part time employment hours to increase from 19 to 22.5 hours per week.

Article 7 Section 1:

Probationary Employee Period shall be 90 days maximum for probationary employees.

Article 10 - Section 4-a -

Remove section 4-a regarding scheduling as agreed.

Article 11

Shift Differential

a. 'Evening Shift & Night Shift:

Article 20 Section 4

Add: Management and designated members of the Union shall meet annually to discuss the shift assignments and the rotation of holidays.

Appendix A Salaries General Annual COLA increases follows:

Article 27 Section 8 Health Insurance -

New: Any eligible employee who retires with fifteen (15) continuous years of service with the County at the time of retirement shall be eligible for healthcare benefits through the County upon retirement."

Article 31 Section 2: Uniforms

The uniform allowance shall be replaced with a Safety Shoe Program allowance for the purchase of certified appropriate footwear through "shoes for Crews" website or an equivalent program/website. The annual \$160 maximum safety shoe allowance per employee shall be administered through the facility which will place the orders and pay the invoices. All footwear worn by Employees shall be ordered through this process. Only certified and approved footwear shall be worn by Employees of the Nursing Home in accordance with industry safety standards.

Add: Management and Designated Union Members shall meet annually to review and

discuss the matter of uniforms.

Article 50: DURATION

Term: The term of this Agreement shall run from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2027.

Article 51 Sick Leave: (New Article)

<u>Sick Leave</u>

 Sick leave shall be used to cover an absence from work necessitated by an employee's illness. Sick leave may be used to cover absences necessitated by scheduled visits to licensed care providers (e.g. doctors, physical therapists, dentists, optometrists, etc.)

- a. Amount Earned and Maximum Accrual Fulltime Employees shall earn leave at the rate of ten (10) days per year, up to a maximum accumulation of two hundred days. Part-time employees (at least 19 hours per week) shall receive a pro-rated amount of sick leave, When the 200 hour cap is reached, no additional sick leave shall accrue until the employee uses his or her sick leave causing the balance to fall below the maximum. Employees shall be permitted to use a maximum of one hundred and sixty five (165) days to use as a credit for health insurance in retirement pursuant to New York State 41-J rules.
- b. Minimum Charge Increment Sick leave shall be charged in increments not less than one-quarter hour.
- c. Notice Employees should submit a request to use sick leave as soon as the need to take leave is known. When the need to use sick leave to care for oneself is unforeseen, the employee must telephone or otherwise contact his or her supervisor within <u>one hour</u> of his or her scheduled start time and indicate the need to use sick leave.
- Medical Certification- The County may request satisfactory proof of illness for an absence from a medical professional for any absences of three (3) workdays or more.
- 2. Advance sick leave: Advance sick leave is a discretionary loan of regular sick leave that is paid back to the County through the normal sick leave accrual process.

Advanced sick leave may be granted, at the discretion of the Nursing Home Director

or their designee, to an employee absent from work due to personal illness who has

exhausted all accumulated sick, personal, vacation, floating holiday and

compensatory time leave credits. The notice and approval requirements, the

medical certification requirements and the FMLA leave coordination requirements

of regular sick leave apply to advanced sick leave.

- 1. Eligibility. To be eligible for advanced sick leave an employee must first complete:
 - (a) One year of full-time service,
 - (b) Two years of part-time service, or
 - (c) An equivalent combination of full and part-time service.
- 2. Maximum Amount Advance. Sick leave may be advanced to a maximum of thirteen (13) days.

3. **Minimum Charge Increment.** Advanced sick leave may be charged in increments of no less than a full workday. Advanced sick leave shall only be used to cover absences associated with an illness.

4. **Repayment of Advanced Sick Leave.** Upon an employee's return to work, the negative sick leave balance is reduced each week through application of newly accrued sick leave credits. Employees so reducing a negative sick leave balance shall use vacation, personal and other leave credits to cover subsequent absences due to illness until their sick leave account again shows a positive balance.

5. Negative Balance at Separation. In accepting a grant of advance sick leave, an employee agrees to the following repayment requirements if a negative leave balance remains upon his or her separation from County service. An employee with a negative sick balance at his or her separation from County service shall reimburse the County the money value of such unrepaid advanced sick leave through a deduction to his or her final paycheck. If a full recovery of the value of the negative leave balance cannot be made from the employee's final paycheck, the value will be recorded and payment demanded upon the former employee's return to County service. This shall not limit the County's ability to take additional/alternate collection action against former employees in situations it deems appropriate.

1. Sick Leave at Half Pay. A full-time employee with at least one year of County service may petition the Commissioner of the Department of Human Resources for sick leave at half pay only if: (a) the employee is absent from work due to personal illness unrelated to an occupational accident or disease, and (b) has exhausted all accumulated sick, personal, floating holiday and vacation leave credits, and (c) has exhausted the maximum grant of advanced sick leave, and (d) is not receiving benefits from any employer paid disability insurance program. Unlike advance sick leave, sick leave at half pay need not be paid back by the employee. Additional information concerning eligibility, application procedures, limitations and requirements, and factors considered by the Commissioner of the Department of Human Resources in deciding whether or not to grant sick leave at half pay may he found in the Department of Human Resources. Employees have the option of applying for sick leave at half pay or donated leave, but not both.

A. Maximum Grant. The maximum grant of sick leave at half pay shall be the greater of the following:

- 1. Thirty (30) work days of sick leave at half pay, or
- 2. Twenty (20) work days of sick leave at half pay for each completed year of continuous County service, minus any previous grant of sick leave at half pay since entry into County service.

B. Health Insurance Continuation when on Sick Leave at Half Pay. Employees granted sick leave at half pay are responsible for 50% of their health insurance premium costs.

2. **Donated Leave Program.** An employee absent from work, due to personal illness or due to the need to provide care to an immediate family member (as defined by FMLA) suffering from

a serious health condition, and who has exhausted all accumulated sick, personal, floating holiday, compensatory time

and vacation leave credits may apply to the Department of Human

Resources to participate in the Albany County Leave Donation Program. This program authorizes the County to solicit an employee's coworkers for the donation of personal, vacation and (in some instances) compensatory time credits to be transferred to the requesting employee's sick leave account. Leave donation is a voluntary program and an eligible employee may elect not to participate. Information regarding eligibility, application procedures, limitations, and requirements may be obtained from the Department of Human Resources.

Donated leave cannot be used in conjunction with Sick Leave at half pay.

<u>Quarantine language</u> – If an Employee, who is not ill themselves is required to remain absent because of quarantine and presents a written statement of the local health office proving the necessity of such absence they shall be granted leave with pay for the period of their required absence, without charge to accumulated sick leave, vacation or overtime credits. Prior to return to duty, such employee may be required to submit a written statement from a local health officer having jurisdiction that their return to duty will not jeopardize the health of the other employees.

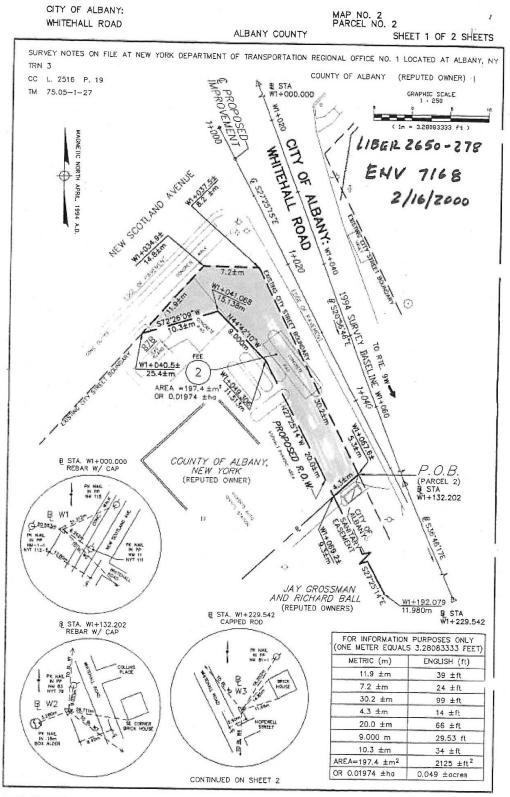

WHEREAS, Each month the Albany County Legislature invites the public to speak before its monthly meeting at a Public Forum, and it routinely invites the public to comment on specific legislation at Public Hearings, and

WHEREAS, Questions have arisen regarding the topics being addressed, order of speakers and/or scope of the specific speaking event, interactions between members and the public, and

WHEREAS, Amending the Legislative Rules of Order, which govern Legislative Public Hearings and Public Forum, can easily rectify the confusion that exists, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the following "Guidelines for Public Comment" shall be incorporated into the Legislative Rules of Order as Appendix B thereto and the Clerk of the Legislature shall display a copy of such Guidelines alongside the signup sheet for each public forum and/or public hearing:

Guidelines for Public Comment

- 1. The Public shall be allowed to speak only during the Public Forum period of the meeting or at such other time as the Chairperson shall allow.
- 2. Speakers shall provide their name, municipality of residence and whether they are speaking on behalf of themselves or another entity.
- 3. Speakers must only speak after being recognized by the Chairperson.
- 4. Speakers must limit their time to five (5) minutes, unless the Chairperson has, in their discretion, lowered the time for speaking.
- 5. Speakers may not yield any remaining time they may have to another speaker.
- 6. Legislators may, after being recognized by the Chairperson, ask for clarification.
- 7. Speakers shall observe the commonly accepted rules of respect, courtesy, decorum, dignity and good taste.
- 8. Speakers shall refrain from comment or behavior that involves:
 - a. Disorderly speech or action; name-calling or personal attacks; obscene or indecent remarks; and derogatory comments on personalities.

- b. Advertising or promoting the sale of products, services, or private enterprise.
- 9. All remarks shall be addressed to the Legislature as a body and not any member thereof.
- 10. Comments, questions, jeering, or other interruptions from the audience are not allowed. Speakers shall likewise not address or respond to members of the audience.
- 11. During Public Comment (Citizen Recognition) periods, speakers may not use the audio-visual equipment located in the hearing room or otherwise make audio-visual presentations. Other visual aids, including, but not limited to, signs, banners, flags, and other props are not allowed.
- 12. The Chairperson has the authority to enforce the rules of decorum. Failure to obey these Rules may result in the forfeiture of the remaining speaking time. Individuals who engage in egregious or repeated violations may be asked to leave the meeting.
- 13. Speakers who have prepared written remarks or supporting documents are encouraged to leave a copy of such remarks and documents with the Clerk to the Board.

WHEREAS, The abuse of opioid pain relievers, once widely prescribed across the United States, has created a crisis of opioid abuse which not only leads to widespread dangers in physical and mental health but also a large number of opioid overdose related deaths across the country, including 81,083 in 2023 alone, and

WHEREAS, As of July 2024, the United States Food and Drug Administration has approved two types of drugs effective in combatting and reversing opioid overdose, a critical tool in saving lives and fighting the opioid epidemic, and

WHEREAS, In New York State, as of July 2024, only naloxone has been widely procured and used in combatting opioid overdoses, and

WHEREAS, It is incumbent on Albany County to examine the possibility of the use of other opioid antagonists, such as nalmefene, in the event they become widely distributed through State action; such examination should not only include existing information about efficacy but also possible deployment strategies to save the largest number of lives, now, therefore, be it

LOCAL LAW NO. "I" FOR 2024

A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, NEW YORK AMENDING CHAPTER 265 OF THE ALBANY COUNTY CODE TO UPDATE THE TATTOO CODE PROVISIONS

Introduced: 6/10/24 By Fein, R. Joyce and Efekoro:

BE IT ENACTED by the Albany County Legislature as follows:

Section 1. Amending § 265-3, Tattoo and/or body piercing artist certification.

§ 265-3 (E) - The applicant <u>must be 18 years of age and</u> shall be required to demonstrate, by examination, knowledge of the provisions of this chapter, including those relating to aseptic technique designed to prevent the spread of infection and contagious disease by tattooing or body piercing practices.

§ 265-3 (G) - A tattoo and/or body piercing artist certification shall expire on <u>July 31</u> of each year, renewable annually in <u>July</u> for the period next commencing <u>August</u> 1.

Section 2. Amending § 265-4, Shop certificate of sanitation.

§ 265-4 (C) - The shop certificate of sanitation shall expire on <u>July 31</u> of each year, renewable annually in <u>July</u> for the period next commencing <u>August</u> 1.

Section 3. Amending § 265-6, Work room.

§ 265-6 (A) - Each tattoo and/or body piercing shop shall have a work room separate and apart from a waiting room or any room or rooms used as such. [The work room shall not be used as a corridor for access to other rooms.] Patrons or customers shall be tattooed and/or body pierced only in said work room.

§ 265-6 (B) - The work room shall be equipped with hot and cold running water and necessary sinks and basins, or if sinks are unavailable, FDA approved antiseptic rub also known as waterless surgical scrub. For permanent tattoo and/or body piercing shops, self-dispensing waterless scrub stations with motion detection or foot pedal activation shall be required if sinks are unavailable.

Section 4. Amending § 265-7, Recordkeeping and information requirements.

§ 265-7 (A) - The records shall be <u>maintained</u>, whether by electronic means or by traditional methods such as ink or indelible pencil, in a dedicated electronic database

<u>or</u> bound book kept solely for this purpose. This book shall be available at a reasonable time for examination by the Health Officer and shall be preserved for at least three years from the date of the last entry therein. The signature of the patron shall be in the bound book record.

Section 5. Amending § 265-8, Operating standards; consent.

§ 265-8 (A) - Written consent for [tattooing or] body piercing of minors, when legally permissible, shall be obtained from at least one parent or legal guardian. The writing shall be notarized and filed in person at the tattoo and/or body piercing shop. Proof of age shall be determined upon presentation of two forms of valid identification. Valid identification shall include: a picture driver's license, picture sheriff's identification or birth certificate.

Section 6. Amending § 265-9, Operating procedures and restrictions.

§ 265-9 (A) - There shall be printed [or mimeographed] instructions, as approved by the Department, given to each patron or customer on the care of the skin after tattooing or body piercing as a precaution to prevent infection.

§ 265-9 (F) - Before working on each patron, the fingernails of the tattoo and/or body piercing artist shall be cleaned with an individual nail file and the hands thoroughly disinfected by scrubbing the hands with a brush, soap, and washing with warm water or using a FDA approved antiseptic rub also known as waterless surgical scrub. Hands that are visibly soiled should be washed prior to the application of a waterless scrub. Subsequent hand washing should be done by washing with warm water and soap using a hand brush, or by utilizing a FDA-approved antiseptic rub, also known as a waterless surgical scrub.

§ 265-9 (I) - Following the cleaning and shaving of the patron's skin, the hands of the tattoo and/or body piercing artist shall again be <u>disinfected as described by</u> <u>Subsection F of this section</u>. Disposable gloves shall then be worn by the tattoo and/or body piercing artist.

Section 7. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of the local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 8. SEQRA Compliance.

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required.

Section 9. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately following its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

LOCAL LAW NO. N FOR 2024

A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, NEW YORK, AMENDING THE ALBANY COUNTY CHARTER AND LOCAL LAW NO. 8 FOR 1993 AS AMENDED

Introduced: 9/9/24 By Cunningham and Willingham:

PURSUANT TO SECTIONS 10 AND 33 OF THE MUNICIPAL HOME RULE LAW, COUNTY LAW SECTION 400 AND SECTION 2702 OF THE ALBANY COUNTY CHARTER:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Albany as follows:

SECTION I. Legislative Intent:

In 2012, a Charter Review Commission was formed by this Honorable Body to determine what, if any, changes could be made to the then decade's old charter. The Commission met routinely over the course of a year and published recommended changes to the Charter, many of which sought to streamline processes or modernize the County's operations. To date, many of the proposed changes have been adopted, but a various substantive changes have evaded adoption. One major proposal by the Charter Review Commission was to replace the County's four, part-time Coroners with a single full-time Medical Examiner. This change would modernize death investigations in the County, a change that many other counties have adopted over the years.

A second major proposal from the Charter Review Commission is to expand the governance of the Board of Contract Administration. The Board's authority was established in 1993, and provided oversight of contracts less than \$100,000. The Charter Review Commission suggested increasing that amount based on inflation, which would have been \$155,000 at the time of the Charter Review Commission's proposal. Today, that amount, adjusted for inflation, is approximately \$215,000. The recommendation of the Charter Review Commission should be adopted to reflect the fact that the Board of Contract Administration is operating in 2024, and not 1993.

Finally, part of the recommendations of the Charter Review Commission was to incorporate various departments into the Charter, departments that were absent (or not yet in existence) in the original document. These proposed changes do just that, with the Division of Information Services and the newly retitled Department of Parks and Recreation.

SECTION II. Article 5 of the Albany County Charter is hereby amended to create the following sections:

Section 504: Information Services.

There shall be within the Department of Management and Budget an independent Division of Information Services headed by a Chief Information Officer. The Chief Information Officer shall be appointed by the County Executive, subject to confirmation by the County Legislature as provided in Section 302(c) of this Charter, and serve at the pleasure of the County Executive. The Chief Information Officer and staff shall be charged with providing information, technology and computer systems services in support of the county's departments and administrative units. The Chief Information Officer shall perform such other and related duties as shall be required or delegated to her by the County Executive or the County Legislature.

SECTION III. Article 13 of the Albany County Charter is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1301: Board of Contract Administration; powers and duties.

For the purpose of simplifying, clarifying and centralizing the approval process for contracts, there is hereby established a Board of Contract Administration. The Board shall be composed of the County Executive, the Chairperson of the County Legislature and the County Clerk. The Board of Contract Administration is empowered to approve contracts for execution by the County Executive in amounts of not less than twenty thousand dollars (20,000), and, not more than [one] two hundred <u>fifteen</u> thousand dollars (100]<u>215</u>,000), or such higher amount as may be established by local law. The Board shall report [periodically] quarterly to the County Legislature, detailing the contracts approved by it.

Section 1302: Other contract approvals.

The County Executive shall be empowered to approve and execute contracts in an amount less than twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000). The County Legislature shall be empowered to approve contracts for execution by the County Executive in amounts over [one] <u>two</u> hundred <u>fifteen</u> thousand dollars (\$[100]215,000), in addition to those mentioned in Section 204(m) of this Charter. The County Executive shall not, through change orders, amendments, renewals, or any other method or device, exceed such twenty thousand dollar (\$20,000) limit with respect to any vendor or subject matter, without approval of the County Legislature.

Section 1303: Annual Adjusted Amount

The dollar amounts set forth above in sections 1301 and 1302 of this Article shall be adjusted annually on the first day of January each year by the Consumer Price Index ("CPI") to keep pace with inflation. The County's Department of Management and Budget shall sue the annual CPI data for adjustment. The annual adjusted dollar amount shall be provided to the Clerk of the Legislature by the Commissioner of Management and Budget upon it being determined.

SECTION IV. Article 19 of the Albany County Charter is hereby repealed entirely.

Article 9: Department of Health is hereby amended by adding the following subsections:

Section 905: Office of Medical Examiner; Appointment; Qualifications

- (a) There shall be an Office of Medical Examiner, a division of the Albany County Department of Health. The Office shall be headed by a Chief Medical Examiner who shall be appointed by the County Executive for a six-year term, subject to confirmation by the County Legislature. At the time of their appointment, and throughout their appointment, the Medical Examiner shall be and remain duly licensed and entitled to practice medicine in the State of New York and shall have an expertise in forensic pathology and such other qualifications for the responsibilities of the Office as determined by the Commissioner of Health. Notwithstanding the provisions of Public Officer's Law Section 38 and County Law Section 400, if the Office of Chief Medical Examiner becomes vacant other than by expiration of term, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the County Executive for a five-year term, subject to confirmation by the County Legislature.
- (b) The Chief Medical Examiner, within the appropriations made therefor, shall appoint a Chief Deputy Medical Examiner, who shall also be a physician licensed to practice medicine in the State of New York. In addition to such other duties as may be assigned by the Chief Medical Examiner, the Chief Deputy Medical Examiner shall possess the powers and perform the duties of the Medical Examiner during his absence or inability to act.
- (c) The Chief Medical Examiner, within the appropriations made therefor, may, in conformity with the rules and regulations applicable to the civil service, appoint such forensic investigators and deputy medical examiners as may be authorized by the County Legislature. Forensic investigators and deputy medical examiners shall assist the Chief Medical Examiner in the conduct of investigations and the discharge of his other duties and responsibilities; shall conduct tests and examinations and furnish forensic, medical, investigative and technical services; and shall possess such qualifications and perform such other duties as may be determined by the Chief Medical Examiner.

SECTION VI. Article 20 of the Albany County Charter is hereby repealed entirely and replaced as follows:

Article 20: Parks and Recreation.

There shall be a Parks and Recreation Department which shall be responsible for providing recreation programs and opportunities for the Albany County community that develops fundamental social, emotional, physical, and cognitive skills that promote a higher quality of life. The department head shall be the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation. The Commissioner of Parks and Recreation shall be appointed by the County Executive, subject to confirmation by the County Legislature as provided in Section 302(c) of this Charter, and serve at the pleasure of the County Executive. The Commissioner of Parks and Recreation shall perform such other and related duties as shall be required or delegated to her by the County Executive or the County Legislature.

SECTION VII. SEQRA Compliance

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required

SECTION VIII. Effective Date.

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the office of the Secretary of State if it is approved by a affirmative vote of the qualified electors of the County of Albany voting upon a proposition for its approval at the next general election in conformity with the provisions of Section 34 of the New York Municipal Home Rule Law and Section 2702 of the Albany County Charter.

LOCAL LAW NO. O FOR 2024

A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, NEW YORK AMENDING CHAPTER 242 OF THE ALBANY COUNTY CODE TO PROHIBIT THE SALE OF CAMOUFLAGED VAPING DEVICES IN ALBANY COUNTY

Introduced: 9/9/24 By Cunningham, Willingham, McLean Lane, McLaughlin and Miller:

BE IT ENACTED by the Legislature of the County of Albany as follows:

SECTION I. Article Creation.

Chapter 242, Article VII, Camouflaged Vaping Devices, is hereby created

SECTION II. § 242-45 Legislative Intent and Purpose

This Legislature determines that the use of tobacco and vaping products (electronic aerosol delivery systems) can permanently damage developing adolescent brains as nicotine has been shown to change the way teen brains function, and adversely affecting the lungs, heart, kidneys and reproductive system, and has also been linked to increased feelings of depression, anxiety and stress among young people.

This Legislature further finds that vaping devices are now manufactured to look like highlighters, USB drives, ballpoint pens, smartphone cases and smartwatches to make electronic or e-cigarettes appear less harmful and more appealing to children and young adults.

This Legislature also determines that these predatory products are clearly targeted to minors and intentionally manufactured to look like school supplies or personal belongings to evade detection from administrators, teachers and parents.

Therefore, the purpose of this law is to prohibit all vaping products inclusive of vape pens disguised as everyday school supplies.

SECTION III. § 242-46 Authority

This article is enacted by the Albany County Legislature pursuant to its authority to adopt local laws under the New York State Constitution Article IX and Municipal Home Rule Law § 10.

SECTION IV. § 242-47 Definitions

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

Department: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Commissioner: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Electronic Aerosol Delivery System: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Person: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-3

Sell: shall mean to sell, exchange, give or dispose of to another or offer to or agree to do the same.

SECTION V. §242-48 Restrictions on Sales

No person shall sell, offer for sale, or permit the sale to any person of any electronic aerosol delivery system (commonly referred to as vapor products or electronic cigarettes) that looks like or resembles school supplies or common personal items such as, but not limited to, highlighters, USB drives, ballpoint pens, smartphone cases, smartwatches and/or backpacks within the County of Albany.

SECTION VI: §242-49 Violation and Penalties; Enforcement

- a. Any person who intentionally violates the provisions of this Chapter shall be guilty of an unclassified misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500 for the first violation, and up to \$1,000 for each subsequent violation. Each violation shall constitute a spate and distinct offense.
- **b.** This chapter shall not be construed to exclude any other remedy provided by law for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the people of Albany County.

SECTION VII. §242-50 Rules and Regulations

The Department may issue and amend rules, regulations, standards, guidelines, or conditions to implement and enforce this chapter.

SECTION VIII. Severability

If any part or provision of this local law, or the application thereof to any individual or circumstance, is held invalid, the remainder of the local law shall not be affected thereby and shall continue in force and effect.

SECTION IX. SEQRA Compliance

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required.

SECTION X. § 270-54 Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on January 1, 2025 and its filing with the Secretary of State as required by §27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ALBANY, NEW YORK AMENDING CHAPTER 242 OF THE ALBANY COUNTY CODE TO PROVIDE A LOCAL LICENSING SYSTEM FOR TOBACCO AND RELATED PRODUCTS

Introduced: 9/9/24 By: Cunningham, Willingham, McLean Lane, McLaughlin and Miller:

BE IT ENACTED by the Legislature of the County of Albany as follows:

SECTION I. Article Creation.

Chapter 242, Article VI, Tobacco Retail Licensing, is hereby created

SECTION II. Title

This law shall be known as the "Quit Using Inhalants & Tobacco (QUIT Act).

SECTION III. § 242-32 Legislative Intent and Purpose

In accordance with New York State Public Health Law § 1399-ii, the County of Albany intends to limit the concentration of smoke shops and tobacco retailers within the County. The regulations herein are intended to further the goals of New York State's tobacco use prevention and control program, due to the known adverse impacts of tobacco and nicotine use. In furtherance of the state's goals, the County finds that:

a. Smoke shop and tobacco retailer density is associated with higher rates of tobacco use in both youth and adult populations; and

b. Adolescent brains are vulnerable to the effects of nicotine and to nicotine dependency; and

c. Tobacco use leads to preventable death and disease in New York State; and

d. The County of Albany has a substantial interest in reducing the number of individuals of all ages who use cigarettes and other tobacco products, and a particular interest in protecting adolescents from tobacco dependence and the illnesses and premature death associated with tobacco use, thus

f. The restriction of increasing smoke shop and tobacco retailer density will reduce the availability of nicotine products to residents, and in particular young residents, thus reducing risk to the public's health, safety, and wellbeing. g. This Local Law shall be

SECTION IV. § 242-33 Authority

This article is enacted by the Albany County Legislature pursuant to its authority to adopt local laws under the New York State Constitution Article IX and Municipal Home Rule Law § 10.

SECTION V. § 242-34 Definitions

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

Accessory: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Component or Part: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Constituent: An ingredient, substance, chemical, or compound, other than tobacco, water, reconstituted tobacco sheet, or propylene glycol or vegetable glycerin that is added by the manufacturer to a covered product during the processing, manufacture, or packing of the covered product.

Covered Product: A tobacco product, electronic aerosol delivery system, or another product regulated by § 1399-cc of the Public Health Law.

Department: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Commissioner: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

Electronic Aerosol Delivery System: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20.

New Tobacco Retail License: a tobacco retail license that is not a renewed tobacco retail license.

Person: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-3

Renewed Tobacco Retail License: A tobacco retail license issued to an applicant for the same location at which the applicant possessed a valid tobacco retail license during the previous 12 months.

Sell: Shall mean to sell, exchange, give or dispose of to another or offer to or agree to do the same.

School: A public or independent kindergarten, elementary, middle, junior high, or high school.

Tobacco Product: as defined in Chapter 242 §242-20

Tobacco Retailer: A retailer licensed pursuant to this chapter.

Tobacco Retail License: A license issued pursuant to Chapter 242 §242-35 by the Department to a person to engage in the retail sale in the County of Albany of a covered product.

SECTION VI. §242-35 Tobacco Retail License Required.

- a. No person shall sell, offer for sale, or permit the sale of a covered product by retail within the County of Albany without a valid tobacco retail license. A tobacco retail license is not required for a wholesale dealer who sells products to retail dealers for the purpose of resale only and does not sell a covered product directly to consumers.
- b. Notwithstanding the requirements set forth in Subsection A, this chapter shall not apply to registered organizations pursuant to § 3364 of the Public Health Law.
- c. A tobacco retail license issued pursuant to this chapter is nontransferable and non-assignable and valid only for the applicant and the specific address indicated on the tobacco retail license. A separate tobacco retail license is required for each address where a covered product is sold or offered for sale. A change in business ownership or business address requires a new tobacco retail license.

SECTION VII. §242-36 License Application and Application Fee

- a. An application for a new tobacco retail license or a renewed tobacco retail license shall be submitted to the Department in writing upon a form provided by the Department and shall contain information as required by the Department. The Department may require the forms to be signed and verified by the applicant or an authorized agent thereof.
- b. Each application for a tobacco retail license shall be accompanied by a non-refundable application fee of \$240.
- c. Upon the receipt of a completed application for a tobacco retail license and the application fee required by Subsection B, the Department may inspect the location at which sales of a covered product are to be permitted. The Department may ask the applicant to provide additional information that is reasonably related to the determination of whether a tobacco retail license may issue.

SECTION VIII. §242-37 Issuance of Licenses

a. No tobacco retail license shall be issued to a seller of a covered product that is not in a fixed, permanent location.

- b. The issuance of a tobacco retail license pursuant to this chapter is done in the Department's discretion and shall not confer upon licensee any property rights in the continued possession of the license.
- c. The Department shall collect from the applicant the tobacco retail license fee prescribed by §242-36(b); §242-38(b) prior to issuing a tobacco retail license.
- d. The Department may refuse to issue a tobacco retail license to an applicant if it finds that one or more of the following bases for denial exists:
 - 1. The information presented in the application is incomplete, inaccurate, false, or misleading;
 - 2. The fee for the application has not been paid as required;
 - 3. The applicant does not possess a valid certificate of registration required by state or federal law for the sale of a covered product;
 - 4. The Department has previously revoked a tobacco retail license issued under this chapter to the applicant;
 - 5. The Department has previously revoked a tobacco retail license issued under this chapter for the same address or location;
 - 6. The applicant has been found by a court of law or administrative body to have violated a federal, state, or local law pertaining to:
 - i. Trafficking in contraband tobacco products or illegal drugs;
 - ii. The payment or collection of taxes on a covered product
 - iii. The display of a covered product or of health warnings pertaining to a covered product; or
 - iv. The sale of a covered product.
 - 7. The applicant has not paid to the Count of Albany outstanding fees, fines, penalties, or other charges owed to the Count of Albany, including the fee for the tobacco retail license required by §242-36(b); §242-389(b) § 114-7; or
 - 8. The Department determines, in accordance with written criteria established to further the purposes of this chapter, that the applicant is otherwise not fit to hold a tobacco retail license.

SECTION IX. §242-38 License Term and Annual Fee

- a. A tobacco retail license issued pursuant to this chapter shall be valid for no more than one year and shall expire on December 31. As set forth in § 114-12 revocation of licenses, a tobacco retail license may be revoked for cause by the Department prior to its expiration.
- b. The tobacco retailer shall pay an annual tobacco retail license fee of \$240.
- c. The Director may discount the tobacco retail license fee required by §242-36(b); §242-38(b) for an application received within six months of the expiration date.

SECTION X: §242-39 Display of License

- a. A tobacco retail license issued pursuant to this chapter shall be conspicuously displayed at the location where a covered product is sold so that it is readily visible to customers.
- b. Selling, offering for sale, or permitting the sale of a covered product without a valid tobacco retail license displayed in accordance with Subsection (a) constitutes a violation of this chapter.

SECTION XI: §242-40 Number of Licenses Issued

- a. For the first year after the effective date of this chapter, the Department shall accept an application for a tobacco retail license only from an applicant for the same location at which the applicant possessed a valid certificate of registration as a tobacco retail dealer or electronic aerosol delivery system (vapor) products dealer from the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance 180 days prior to the effective date of this chapter.
- b. Beginning one year after the effective date of this chapter, the Department shall issue a renewed tobacco retail license to eligible applicants.
- c. Thereafter, the Department shall issue only one new tobacco retail license for every two tobacco retail licenses that are not renewed, until a floor of hundred fifty (150) is reached. Thereafter, the Department shall evaluate the effect of this local law on reducing tobacco usage by reducing the density of tobacco retailers.
- d. Whenever the number of valid applications for a new tobacco retail license exceeds the maximum number of new tobacco retail licenses that may be issued pursuant to this section, the Department shall grant new tobacco retail licenses using the following priorities:
 - 1. A new tobacco retail license shall be granted, first, to an applicant for an establishment whose property line is located 1,000 feet or more from the nearest point of the property line of a school who holds but does not seek to renew a valid tobacco retail license for an establishment whose property line is within 1,000 feet of the nearest point of the property line of a school. If there are more valid applications from these applicants than the number of available new tobacco retail licenses, the new tobacco retail license(s) shall be granted to these applicants by lottery;
 - 2. A new tobacco retail license shall be granted, second, to an applicant whose property line is located 1,000 feet or more from the nearest point of the property line of a school. If there are more valid applications from these applicants than the number of available new tobacco retail licenses, the new tobacco retail license(s) shall be granted to these applicants by lottery;
 - 3. A new tobacco retail license shall be granted, third, to an applicant who will sell a covered product at an establishment where the operator restricts entry to persons 21 years and older. If there are more valid applications from these applicants than the number of available new

tobacco retail licenses, the new tobacco retail license(s) shall be granted to these applicants by lottery;

4. Any remaining new tobacco retail licenses shall be granted to applicants by lottery.

SECTION XII: §242-41 Sales of Electronic Aerosol Delivery Systems

No tobacco retailer whose property line is located within 1,000 feet of the nearest point of the property line of a school shall distribute without charge, sell, offer for sale, or possess with intent to sell an electronic aerosol delivery system, commonly known as vapor products or electronic cigarettes.

SECTION XIII: §242-42 Violation and Penalties; Enforcement

- a. The Department or its authorized designee(s) shall enforce the provisions of this chapter. The Department may conduct periodic inspections to ensure compliance with this chapter.
- b. In addition to the penalties provided for in § 114-12, a person found to be in violation of this chapter shall be liable for a civil penalty of not more than \$250 for the first violation, not more than \$500 for the second violation within a two-year period, and not more than \$1,000 for the third and each subsequent violation within a two-year period, or as determined by the Director. Each day on which a violation occurs shall be considered a separate and distinct violation.

SECTION XIV. § 242-43 Revocation of Licenses

- a. The Department may suspend or revoke a tobacco retail license issued pursuant to this chapter for violations of the terms and conditions of this chapter or for violation of a federal, state, or local law or regulation pertaining to:
 - 1. Trafficking a contraband covered product or illegal drug;
 - 2. The payment or collection of taxes on a covered product;
 - 3. The display of a covered product or of health warnings pertaining to a covered product; or
 - 4. The sale of a covered product.
- b. The Department may revoke a tobacco retail license if the Department finds that one or more of the bases for denial of a license under §242-37 existed at the time application was made or at any time before the license issued.
